


1. ANDERSON, JOHN. The Broadway Railroad. New York: John Anderson, N.d. [c.1853]. A pamphlet proposing the installation of horse-drawn cars on rails in the center of Broadway, estimated to travel at six miles an hour, which is faster than any NYC bus today. Anderson, owner of a tobacco shop on the street, claims his plan will improve travel time and the value of property on Broadway. He apparently came to an agreement with the city at some later date but the system was never built. First edition. 21 cm; 8 pp.; folding lithograph showing the suggested railroad in operation. 





In the cheapest binding it originally cost \$6; this binding cost \$10 and this copy includes additional related clippings laid in. It identifies the side streets and notes the house numbers and occupants of most of the buildings.

7. DE LEEUW, R. M. Both Sides of Broadway from Bowling Green to Central Park New York City. New York: The De Leeuw Riehl Publishing Co., N.d. [1910]. A collection of photographs showing the buildings and houses on both sides of Broadway from Bowling Green to Central Park, with period advertisements liberally interspersed. Featured in Christopher Grey's *New York Times* story about rare NYC Books: "*Both Sides of Broadway*, 1911 (I saw only one copy, damaged,). Wow, talk about scope! Someone photographed both sides of New York's jumpingest street, from the Battery up to 59th....captures street life like few other works. Paperbound and terribly difficult to find, almost never in good condition." First edition. Oblong 4to; 503 pp.; illustrated from photographs. 
8. FERRE, BARR. Fort Tryon Hall: The Residence of C.K.G. Billings, Esq. A Descriptive and Illustrated Catalogue Issued Privately by the Owner. Washington Heights, New York, 1911. Descriptions by Barr Ferree, folio, partially paginated, full gilt-embossed red Morocco leather, t.e.g., with watered silk endpapers. Very good. This volume describes and illustrates in detail the house, its contents, and artwork. Billings, one of the more flamboyant of New York's Gilded Age millionaires, arranged the infamous horseback dinner for 36 of his friends, who dined astride horses in the ballroom of the Sherry's restaurant on Fifth Avenue with waiters dressed as grooms, and dirt carted in to absorb the substance (if not the smells) of the horses' natural functions. Additional material laid in, including an illustration of the later stable building (architecturally finer than the main house), newspaper and book articles and a 1996 Streetscapes column describing the extant double-Scurved, galleried entrance driveway (the house burned down decades ago). \$350.00

9. HERBERT, MAURICE. On the Hudson: Residence of Charles M. Schwab. New York, 1905, 11" x 15", rebound in gilt-stamped full leather with the original embossed and colored pictorial leather cover laid down on the front cover, signed on the dedication page by Hebert, who was the building's architect, about 75 leaves, some protected with tissue guards, unpaginated but some pages numbered (incorrectly and seemingly randomly), very good. Designed as a French Renaissance chateau set in its own landscaped park and based primarily on Chenonceaux, the house was erected on a full-block site at Riverside Drive and West End Avenue from 73rd to 74th Street. A rare limited production probably given by Schwab to his friends, plus some of the contractors who worked on the building, many of whom placed ads at the back of the book. Completed in 1907 and razed in 1948. Illustrated with photogravures, color and halftone views of the house and contents, plus photomontages of newspaper articles, letters, and long descriptions of the house, which was built by steel \$750.00

magnate Charles Schwab to rival that of his former partner Andrew Carnegie.










These huge maps are each a visual tour-de-force, which uniquely and collectively described portions of Manhattan. \$1,950.00

28. A New Yorker's Idea of The United States of America. Copyright by Daniel K. Wallingford, 452 West 144th Street, New York, NY, [image size]15½" x 19½" (frame size), framed. This is a color variant of the 1939 reissue in large format of the map first published in smaller format in 1936 in black and white by the Columbia University Press, and later in 1937 for the Times Book Fair.



This scarce and whimsical distortion of the United State satirizes the alleged arrogance and ignorance of the supposedly-typical New Yorker as evidenced by his ideas of the rest of the country. Names and places are wildly inaccurate and almost randomly placed. Manhattan is shown running from Albany down to Cape May; Staten Island is just off the coast of North Carolina; and Florida is a giant appendage about the size of Mexico. Minneapolis and Indianapolis are shown as the Twin Cities in the middle of Michigan, and Wyoming is shown as the capital of Montana. There are two sidebars of added information, including "Indiana was an Indian Reservation until just recently, wasn't it?" and "We have cousins in the West; They live in Wilmington, Delaware." This map predates by 40 years Saul Steinberg's New Yorker cover showing "The View of the World from Ninth Avenue" and is vastly more complex and interesting.





The great map of mid-century Manhattan based on thousands of aerial photographs (reproduced with a forgivable lack of fidelity), showing axonometric representations of every building in mid-town Manhattan from the Central Park to approximately 20th St. The map was commissioned for exhibition at the 1964 World's Fair, and

Bollmann reproduced it in a smaller scale for his multilingual New York guidebook. That is the most common version of the map; this lithographed edition is on heavy stock for mounting as a poster. Though slightly smaller than the folding map it is cleaner and not cluttered with names and logos of stores, restaurants, and tourist attractions like the larger map; and, of course, has no folds. 
