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





A discussion of the basic essentials of pool design, construction, and maintenance. Showing work by Treanor and Fatio, C. D. Wagstaff, others. Discusses wading pools, recreation pools, large swimming and diving pools, ornamental and garden pools, and salt water pools, with designs of locker rooms, hygienic details, etc. and a list of Josam's installations, with location and architect.

A verbatim record of a symposium held at the School of Architecture from March to May of 1961, featuring Corbusier and Gropius, in person, and Mies by a taped interview. The papers presented in the four sections represent a re-examination of the beginnings of contemporary architecture by its founders and by their second and third generation offspring. Symposium a result of the general feeling that these were dark days for modern architecture. Errata slip laid-in, with card of Acting Dean Kenneth Smith. This is the first edition published in 1963 by Columbia; printed offset and bound in wrappers. Scarce.



Anshen and Allen won a closed 1965 competition among five invited architecture firms including Louis I. Kahn, SOM, Eero Saarinen and Associates, and Vernon DeMars. The program called for a large 200-foot planetarium, eight assembly halls, a science education center with classrooms, laboratories, a television studio, offices, and a cafeteria, a 600-seat auditorium with a rotating stage, a science information center, and parking for 750 vehicles. The jury consisted of architects Pietro Belluschi, Richard M. Bennett, and Clarence W.W. Mayhew, along with University of California Regents Donald H. McLaughlin and Edwin Pauley. The Lawrence Hall Science Committee membership was virtually the contemporary CIA executive roster. With later floor plan and guide laid-in. \$55.00



26. (Brunner) AITKEN, ROBERT I. et al. Arnold Brunner and His Work. New York: Press of the AIA, Inc., 1926. Brunner was an American architect educated at MIT and active at the turn of the century in New York. His career began with George Post but in1898 he independently won the competition for the Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York, and soon after the competition for the Federal Building at Cleveland, as well as for one of the buildings in an aborted plan for a massive renewal of Washington DC. He had a strong interest in city planning and wrote reports for Albany, Rochester, and Baltimore emphasizing zoning and building height limits. A series of interesting, if not overly critical, reminiscences of the man as friend, architect, and city planner is followed by 93 plates of illustrations, including photographs and sketches of executed work and projects, as well as pages of drawing's from Brunner's notebooks.



With chapters on the building's architecture and architects, history and techniques of construction, Toledo architecture of the time of construction, etc., as well discussions of the museum and library.
